

## Discussion Questions Uncommon Integrity

1. We don't often take oaths or swear on God's name in our culture today. What are some of the contexts in which we take oaths or make agreements that this principle applies?
2. Think of a person that you consider to be a person of integrity. What characteristics or qualities do they possess that reflects their integrity? How have you seen their integrity play out in their life?
3. We all value integrity and we know that it isn't built in a day. Why, then, do we so often trade our integrity for immediate gratification?
4. To build integrity we must all accept responsibility. Is there something that you know you ought to do but just aren't doing it? Would you do something morally wrong if you knew that you would never be caught? When confronted about a moral failure or just a failure in your life how do you typically respond? Do you take responsibility or try to talk your way out of it? Think of specific examples and discuss them.
5. Integrity is comprehensive to every area of your life. You can't be a person of integrity if you are a great spouse but morally compromised at work. Is there one specific arena of your life that you are more tempted to cut corners or loosen your moral standards? Explain why you think that is.
6. When it comes to integrity doing the right thing simply isn't enough, it also has to be with the right motive. (1 Samuel 16:7) Is there a specific area of your life that you tend to struggle with having the proper motive? Explain.
7. Ask some people close to you if they really trust you to do what you say you will do?
